## With Deepest Sympathy

Dr Maximilian Brändle OAM 25 July 1937 – 28 February 2019



A standard bearer for multiculturalism and civilised values Dr Maximilian Brändle OAM died from a heart condition at the end of February in Brisbane, Australia.

Max was born in Winterthur, Switzerland, settling in Brisbane in 1961. He became an Associate Professor at The University of Queensland and on retirement he joined Griffith University as an adjunct a/professor. He served for six years as president or secretary of the Swiss Australian Chamber of Commerce and Industry, Queensland Chapter. Max was the second full-time Director of the Institute of Modern Languages at The Queensland University, from 1970 to 1998.

In 1965, he founded the *Swiss News* (which still appears in the same format today). And he was the last living member of the founding committee of the Swiss Society of Queensland.

A Swiss-born linguist who migrated to Australia to teach languages, he was described this week by the Swiss Consulate General as "respected throughout his life at both ends of the Earth". He was "forward-looking with a great capacity to reflect on the human condition".

He was the honorary chairman of the Language Services Committee of World Expo 88 and was active in various associations promoting international education, business, culture, community welfare and Australian/EU affairs. He was president of the Dante Alighieri Society and secretary of the Australian Goethe Society, both of Brisbane. For 32 years he represented the Swiss community in Australia in the Berne-based 'Parliament of the Swiss Abroad'.

With these interests Max flourished as an historian with abundant subjects to choose from for his books and biographies.

He had many connections, sometimes being billed as an "activist" for his engagement with ethnic community organisations or international agencies, for example as President of the *Migrant Welcome Association in Queensland* for eight years, and as a member of the *Australian Council for Europe (ACE)*.

In 2003 he received the Medal of the Order of Australia for distinguished commitment to the promotion of multiculturalism.

The impact of Max was in his personality, which presented a match of presence and warmth, noted by Mrs Elfi Massey-Vallazza, President of the ACE: "He had an enormous capacity for making people feel at ease. He was a world citizen and an example to all of us".

Max made a last visit to Europe not long before his death, with some of his five adult children, revisiting old familiar places and art galleries.

The family tributes filled out the picture of a "caring and reliable father who always wanted the best for his children; it was a life "all about risks and adventure, culture and history. He was a walking, talking encyclopaedia who loved to enlighten you whenever the opportunity arose. He loved to travel and enjoy cultures and new people. When he wasn't being brilliant he was a lovable friend. He liked chocolate and would debate the merits of the Belgian or Swiss varieties".

The committee of the Swiss Society of Queensland and Swiss club members would like to express their deepest sympathy to family and friends of Max.

Max will be very much missed.

Hans Peter (better known as Peter) was born in Manila on 26 August 1954 as first of three children to Hans and Myrta, joined by Bruno in 1956 and Susi in 1958.

In 1961 the family left the Philippines, briefly living in Switzerland before moving to Lima, Peru. Is this how Peter got the travel bug?

In 1970 the family packed up again and returned to Switzerland where Peter finished high school and joined Swissair as apprentice aircraft mechanic. His other passion was electronics and IT. He also taught himself how to program computers and later he made a living of it.

From 1978 he travelled the word for a few years including most of Europe, Africa, Russia and Australia servicing and installing turbines in power stations. In 1987 he moved to Australia to fulfil a childhood dream, to run a 'family business' Silvian Tourist Village Caran Park, together with Bruno, Susi and the parents. In 1992 Peter was diagnosed with pituitary gland disorder. Tests revealed that he had a tumour growing around his eye nerves that would potentially render him blind unless it was removed. The operation was high risk and unfortunately, Peter was left with partial blindness.

In 1994 he decided to move back to Switzerland where better public transport meant more independence and more options to find work suitable to his condition. Susi also moved back to Switzerland and, together with her new husband Ruedi and Peter, formed an IT consulting company. Peter was able to turn his hobby of 'all things computer and programming' into full time work and lived an interesting and fulfilling life. They also built a house together with a separate flat for Peter where Susi could look after him when needed. The three worked

together and travelled the world ....happy times and good memories

In 2005 Peter's health started to deteriorate having unpredictable falls.... radiation damage was affecting his balance and started to impede his speech. Two years later he returned to Australia. He moved into a unit at Westminster House, the new 'family business' operated by Bruno.

He loved to play 'Jass', a Swiss card game. In 2012, a few days after coming home from a championship in Melbourne, he ended up in hospital. Peter was no longer able to move his limbs or speak. Susi flew over from Switzerland and during the following months spent countless hours at the hospital doing rehab with Peter, literally bringing him back to life. In August Peter left hospital and moved into Hillview House. He was now wheelchair bound but still managed to go on further cruises and enjoy life.

Unfortunately, Peter fell ill in November, and after further operations and complications, didn't recover. He passed away on 19 March 2019, with Susi, Bruno, Aunty Olive and 2 close friends by his bedside, peacefully and without pain.

Peter was humble and appreciative, even if sometimes he felt he had not been 'given a fair go' when it came to health and lifestyle, he never complained. He was a truly remarkable person.

We will miss your trademark 'thumbs up' when you were content. Farewell Peter.

### Organisation of the Swiss Abroad (CSA)

### CSA meeting 23 March 2019 in Berne

For the first time I had the pleasure to attend the March meeting of the Council of the Swiss Abroad (CSA) in Berne. In the past I was twice at the August conferences and there are a few differences. The conference in August is open to all Swiss Abroad and I can highly recommend it for meeting Swiss like you from all over the world. The March one is always in Berne and gives us more opportunities to meet with interested members of the Swiss parliament. The now yearly exchange in the Bundeshaus with federal parliamentarian representing several different parties was too short but I hope going in the right direction of more productive interactions.

The actual meeting of the CSA, which is the legislative body of the Organisation of the Swiss Abroad (OSA), was held on Saturday, 23 March in the town hall of Berne in the picturesque old town. Admittedly, there were a few housekeeping issues like elections, finances and setting up the agenda for the year to be dealt with, as well as the recurring issues of the Swiss old age insurance (AHV), banking and e-voting.

The highlights for me where two informative talks, first from representatives of the Federal compensation office and then about the plans for a Swiss Holocaust victims memorial. Switzerland did not have many victims of WW2 and most of them were Swiss living abroad. Very little research or acknowledgement exists about the maybe thousand forgotten Swiss.

## And we played at the 'Jass Meisterschaft' Brisbane 2019

"Jass Meisterschaft"? No, Henrietta, nothing to do with Jazz! Although it is a proven fact that it can be just as exhilarating, and just as calming as a slow Blues number. My thesis is that, immediately upon picking up a set of cards, people feel calm, totally de-stressed and oblivious of their surroundings. It is an undisputed fact that the anticipation of potentially picking up four 'Buure' (according to statistics about 1 in 500) generates lots of positive vibes. Although by my own experience, the odds are more likely to be 1 in 5.000...

Anyway, when competing in a Jass Championship, strikes of pure, unadulterated luck such as a big Wys are eliminated. Not only are there no extra points for a Wys, certainly not 100 extra points for a Match (when the opposing team doesn't strike a single trick), but there is absolutely no additional gain for a 'Bergpriis' (the first team to get to half way of the required score) or penalty points for the 'Schniider' (the team not reaching half way before your opposition has declared victory). And to make matters worse, there is no benefit of a decent multiplier, such as triple for 'Obe-n-abe' or 'Une-n-ue'. Quite boring then really? Not so!

Jass much contributes to self-teaching people Anger Control (as when your partner didn't notice that you threw out the 'Schilte Sibni' at the very beginning of the round), handle disappointment (such as when you pick up the lousiest set of cards when it is your turn to decide what is trump). Jass trains you to keep bitterness under control (such as when, on the immediate next set you pick up four aces well 'bsetzt' and the opposing team - of course - announces an 'Une-n-ue'). Seriously, the government should subsidise Jass playing handsomely! It would save the nation Millions of dollars in psychologist fees and mental health care! And I haven't even mentioned Memory Training (as in the above mentioned case of the

'Schilte Achti') and Mental Arithmetics when counting the results and/or working out the difference between 157 and the other team's score.

So, for the uninitiated, how could I describe the Swiss national card game called Jass? Well, if you were familiar with the most royal of card games, Bridge: Sort of like comparing Soccer to Aussie Rules Football. For a start. we are playing with just 36 cards instead of the standard 52. This apparently evolved to ensure that it can be played by men, women and children: they needed to keep it small enough to allow small hands to carry all the cards dealt to them. Just as a smaller quantity made it easier for elderly farm workers with thick, arthritic, calloused fingers and low dexterity to sort out their cards. Further, in the German speaking regions of Switzerland they don't use the boring Red & Black, the Heart, Diamonds, Club and Spade suits, but they use imaginative designs called 'Schelle, Rose, Eichle and Schilte'. This of course gives locals a distinct competitive advantage against the Romands or the Ticinesi. And the rules! Groan, I well remember my darling better half (who in one of her earlier lifes played competitive Bridge), voicing a vehement complaint when she was told that it is guite ok to not follow suit and put in a trump instead...

All in all, the Queensland Jass Meisterschaft was again a thumping success. What? Oh, sorry. Yes of course. Thumping is not allowed either in championships. So let me rephrase this: the committee of the Swiss Society of Queensland and all their helpers, the people in the kitchen, the computer gurus who valiantly kept score all day, the potato salad makers and the cake bakers and, last but not least, the participants are to be congratulated on a superbly staged and well organised event!






## The Grand Chalet of Rossinière (Balthus Chalet)

The Grand Chalet at Rossinière is grand indeed: 500 square metres of ground surface, 5 floors, 113 windows, a painted inscription containing 2,800 letters. It is the largest wooden house in Switzerland in a region – Pays-d'Enhaut.

It is one of the oldest chalets in Switzerland, built between 1752 and 1756 on behalf of Jean David Henchoz, a farmer, notary and judge who wanted to create "a house for cheese". The cellar dictated the chalet's dimensions: it was planned for 600 loaves of cheese. The ground floor was intended for commercial exchanges for merchants from Bulle, Vevey and Lyon.

In 1852 it was turned into a hotel, patronised by Englishmen, Americans, Russians and Australians, along with Victor Hugo. In 1977, the painter Balthus (1908–2001), Count Balthazar Klossowski of Rola, acquired it. Now the Grand Chalet is a private property and cannot be visited.
